

Manager's Report by Rob Clarkson




Spring is around the corner and we will be going into the typically rainy season with a lake that is at full pool. Be mindful when applying fertilizers or herbicides that you stay 25' minimum from waters edge. Fertilizers will promote algae growth and Herbicides can have a negative effect on our water supply which also could affect the eco system of our aquatic asset negatively.

Spring is also a great time of year to get out and start cleaning up our property. My staff will be out looking for neglected, unkempt properties and derelict vehicles. Our By-Laws and Rules require residents to keep their property orderly and vehicles licensed or out of the view of the membership. Keeping up with the exterior of our homes not only helps maintain our home values but makes our neighborhood desirable to potential buyers. Yard waste can be burned between sunrise and sunset while attended however NO Construction material is allowed to be burned. Attended Bon-Fires are allowed.

Dues and Assessments final installment ais due May 1st. Members who may have difficulty staying current with this requirement should contact the office and communicate with us any special needs.

Outdoor activity is increasing in our community. Soon it will be commonplace to see members walking pets, children riding bikes, and our maintenance crew out repairing our roads. Let's keep them safe and keep our vehicles with in the 25 MPH posted speed limit. You will also see new stop signs placed throughout the community. Please obey the rules of the road as they pertain to all your vehicles and toys being driven on our roadways.

So all the roads that are going to be addressed in 2021 are highlighted in blue and the total for resurfacing those roads is \$58,902.48. **Rob Clarkson** That's estimated on last year's price. Just so you don't hold me to that. **Anthony Harrell** Oil prices might be a little different than they were this year. So it my change a little bit, but we have roads that we're going to address and an approximate number. So we just need to basically take a vote on this and approve the road plan for 2021. **Tony Harris**

Makes a motion to approve the \$58,902 for the spending for the roads in 2021.

2021 Revised Budget

Anthony Harrell Tony's put together some revisions for us. Tony, you just want to review. **Tony Harris** So you guys have a copy of that one. The biggest revisions are we had a \$246,000 carryover from last year, we've allocated that mainly to the same categories that it came from last year, which is \$35,000 for the restaurant and then a number of small items, the fish stocking carryover that we haven't spent yet, new marina keys, stop signs, and then \$131,000 for roads. That \$131,000 offsets the \$91,000 we had budgeted to pull out of reserves. With the carryover we don't have to do that this year, so we'll leave that \$91 in reserves, and we'll fund our road plan with the carryover. That's the bulk of it.



How and Why to Build a Raised Garden Bed This Season

(StatePoint) Fairly easy to construct and even easier to maintain, raised garden beds are a great way to raise plants and vegetables in the comfort and convenience of your backyard.

In a recent episode of the Exmark Original Series, "Done-in-A-Weekend-Extreme," landscape designer and show host, Doug Scott, spoke to organic gardener Joe Lamp'l of "Growing a Greener World" about the ins and outs of raised garden beds.

Here are some of the top insights and tips Lamp'l shared.

• Why use raised garden beds? A raised garden bed can help facilitate the ideal growing environment, as most people don't have that perfect soil naturally in their yard. Their accessibility makes them easier to work in and maintain. Plus, they're a nice architectural design element in any landscape.



Raised garden beds create visual interest and an ideal growing environment.

- What's the ideal size? The main rule of the thumb applies to width. The bed should be no wider than 4 feet, as you never want to compact the soil when working. Length however, is based on personal preference and needs. As far as height is concerned, you want the roots to be able to grow out and down as much as possible -- 6-inches at minimum. While 12-inches is common, anything higher is a bonus.
- What materials work best? Treated lumber is the most readily available and economical material and will likely last the longest, however, being an organic gardener Lamp'l prefers untreated hardwood, as it lasts almost as long and doesn't contain chemicals. Other materials you have around the home and yard, such as rocks, old tubs, etc., can work too.
- Where's the best location? Build your raised garden bed on level ground, in full sun exposure near a water supply.

DIY Instructions: To build a 10-foot x 4-foot x 18-inch raised bed, you'll need:

- Nine 6-inch x 6-inch x 12-foot cedar timbers
- Tape measure, t-square and marking pencil
- · A saw and extension cord
- One box of 10-inch heavy-duty exterior wood screws
- Ten 24-inch x 1/2-inch rebar stakes

- Twenty 10-inch galvanized timber spikes
- Sledgehammer
- · Impact drill and long drill bit
- Level
- Hammer

- Shovels
- Hardware cloth, wire cutters and fence staples
- · Work gloves, safety glasses and ear plugs
- Wheelbarrow (to transport soil)
- 1. Begin by cutting six, 6 x 6 timbers, each measuring 10-feet 6-inches in length. And six, 6 x 6 timbers, each measuring 4-feet 6-inches in length. Drill rebar holes in each timber.
- 2. Once the first layer of bed has been placed, leveled and squared in your desired location, fasten the corners using 10-inch wood screws. Secure the entire layer to the ground with 10 pieces of rebar.
- 3. Place the second layer of timbers, staggering the corners and fastening them with wood screws. Secure this layer to the first with ten 10-inch galvanized spikes.
- 4. Install galvanized cloth to prevent burrowing pests from eating earthworms and destroying plants.
- 5. Place the third layer of timbers (following above directions.)
- 6. Fill with soil and plants.

want to offer we'll have a small section there too. Matt Ressler How many people did you have come through the last time. **Jennifer Gillian (2037)** We had 300 roughly. About 300 I would say estimated which I thought was great considering the pandemic crisis. It was not all at one time, it was pretty much steady the entire day. **Anthony Harrell** So how long was that one, nine to five? Jennifer Gillian (2037) We did do nine to five. Anthony Harrell And this one's gonna be different. Jennifer Gillian (2037) Well, we saw that it was kind of kind of trailing off by four o'clock. And I think the weather had something to do with that too, because it was rainy that day, and starting to get cold, but we figured since by four o'clock, it was just a few stragglers came in but other than that, I think some of the vendors were a little ready to pack up after that long of a day just sitting around. **Anthony Harrrell** So you're thinking 10 to 4 this time. Jennifer Gillian (2037) I think 10 to 4 would probably be better. We're not gonna kick anybody out at four o'clock, of course. Anthony Harrrell How do you work that with the people who come, do you guys just let them come in and set up for free? Jennifer Gillian (2037) Everybody paid, we had like some entertainment and we had costs. We had Wigglers come for the sipping part of the shopping, so we had to pay them for their bartender and their services. And then we had the vendor setup and for a small fee that kind of covered up our costs for the security and cleanup and paying for Wigglers. We also had entertainment that we had to pay for. Since it was our first event in years, we wanted to keep the cost low for vendors that way we could entice them to come back. And we weren't sure really what the response would be in the community since it's been a few years. Matt Ressler Did you charge the vendors? Jennifer Gillian (2037) We charged \$35 I think it was last time. **Kenneathia Hagen (1991)** We also provided packets for them as well. So in the packet, we have printing costs, each person got a coupon. And I'm trying to remember what we provided, bottled water, pens. I mean, there's a lot more that went into it than just the entertainment but we also had all the door prizes that we contributed part of that. We also paid someone to work the front door so they could give them the information when they came in on how to shop. If you want to wear your mask you can, here's you know, the different things to do. Jennifer Gillian (2037) And we also paid for a few young teen boys to come and help clean up. Kenneathia Hagen (1991) Yes, they helped put up and take down the tables, Jennifer Gillian (2037) Put up tables, vacuum, you know, put them to work to. Jerry Allen What kind of entertainment did you have? **Kenneathia Hagen (1991)** Piano Joe came in and he was here from two to four. **Jennifer Gillian (2037)** I think it was longer than that. **Kenneathia Hagen (1991)** No, he came in to set up and then came back and played. I think it was like two to five. And of course I always negotiate pricing on that. And it's just for the people shopping, that's part of what we like to do is offer as many amenities to come in, bring your friends, bring your mom. This is 10 days before Mother's Day so it should be a good time for shopping as well. **Anthony Harrrell** Of the 35 vendors that you had, I know you probably don't know this exactly, but what percentage were actually Holiday Shores businesses? **Kenneathia Hagen (1991)** I would say that it was probably 70%. And I just emailed all 35 vendors yesterday with a questionnaire and basically it's just a form for them to fill out. If you were to grade the sales that you had, from a one to five, five being the best, grade that for us, would you attend another one if we did it in the spring? What would you change if anything? Were you a Holiday Shores resident or not? Were you only a vendor or were you also a customer? But we had, I would say probably 90% of the vendors that were here came to us and said this is the best show we've had, and we would like to come back to future shows. That's why we decided, you know, to come and ask about this spring. And we did do one, I think it was like seven years ago, that was actually out on, the weather was nice enough that we did it out on the big deck. And we had like 50 vendors at that event. And it was a great event. But again, weather permitting, we have to plan it for inside. **Brian Wood** So are you planning on the \$35

Unkempt properties

Anthony Harrell We are trying to improve the way the community looks, and we were reviewing some photographs as a board to try to provide training for what public safety can look for and write tickets for. And after reviewing the way that our rules are actually written for unkempt properties, we need to have a discussion on how those are written and they're kind of vague. If we want to strengthen the wording I want to open up the discussion for the unkempt properties Brian Wood I think one of the things we talked about was the wording. I think is good for materials and vehicles that we looked at so we just need to update possibly the rules on overgrown properties and maybe even more specific on the properties and actually put in a limit on grass height and provide examples possibly of other overgrown properties that would be a violation. **Anthony Harrell** So the derelict vehicle, that's pretty clear. Tony you want to read that on unkempt properties. Tony Harris Members shall ensure their property is neat and orderly. The keeping of an unkempt or unsightly property or neglecting to maintain one's property may result in corrective guidance and/or punitive measures by Holishor Association. Unkempt or unsightly properties shall be those lots whereby goods or materials of any kind are stored or are allowed to collect in view of other members and the general public in such a manner as to appear uncared-for, cluttered, or messy. Unsightly properties may also include those with overgrown or neglected landscaping and gardens. Landscaping, gardens, and any other ornamental devices shall be in good taste so as not to be offensive to the community in general. **Anthony Harrell** So when it says, to make it appear uncared for. So that's very interpretive, it would depend on who's looking at it. For example, if you have a tree with saplings that are grown around it, you know that the tree hasn't been trimmed around for a while, so you have smaller trees growing out of the base of another tree. You may say that looks uncared for, but the owner may say, well, I like it that way. If we want to start writing violations for some specific things like that, we need to make a rule change and then put it out there for the membership

to see and talk about. If anybody's up for the task or trying to put some verbiage together, I'll entertain that. One of the things that we were looking at was specifically the additional trees growing around the base of a big tree. If there's saplings in there, we don't really have anything that says saplings grown up around boats. Brian Wood So we need some kind of wording as far as undergrowth or something like that to where we can enumerate it specifically. Just so it's more clear. So if we do go to enforce it, then there's no questions about what it is that we're enforcing. We'll have to do some research on some wording on that and come up with something more specific than what we have. **Anthony Harrell** One of these pictures that I have here we're showing a lot that has a boat parked in the lot and the lot has basically just been allowed to go back in the wild. So there's little honeysuckle trees and everything growing in the lot. I don't know how we write that up. **Brian Wood** And then if you put the examples in there like that, you're going to have to have a clause at the end that says, or any other properties deemed unsightly by the board or the lake manager, whoever, because if you don't have it specifically enumerated and if we're putting examples in there, and you don't put everything you can think of somebody's going to come up with something, and they're going to say, well, it doesn't say that. Anthony Harrell So that's kind of where we are now. **Tony Harris** Put a clause in there somewhere, something like included but not limited to. Matt Ressler Does someone want to work on the verbiage for that? **Brian Wood** I can do something with it. **Tony Harris** I can help. Brian Wood Yeah, that's fine. Anthony Harrell All right. Thanks, guys.





Mandarin Orange Salad

½ cup sliced almonds

1 TBSP plus 1 tsp. sugar

1/4 head iceberg lettuce, torn into bite size pieces

1/4 bunch romaine lettuce, torn into bite sized pieces

2 medium stalks celery, chopped (approx. 1 cup)

2 green onions (with tops), thinly sliced Sweet-Sour Dressing (See below)

1 can (11 ounces) mandarin orange segments, drained

Cook almonds and sugar over low heat, stirring constantly, until sugar is melted and almonds are coated. Cool and break apart. Store at room temperature.

Place lettuce and romaine in plastic bag; add celery and onions. Pour Sweet-Sour Dressing into bag. Add orange segments. Close bag tightly and shake until greens and orange segments are well coated. Add almonds and shake.

2 TBSP cider vinegar

1 TBSP snipped parsley

1 tsp. salt

Dash pepper

Dash red pepper sauce (optional)

Shake all ingredients in tightly covered jar and refrigerate.

DO-AHEAD TIP: Before dressing is added, bag of salad greens can be closed tightly and refrigerated no longer than 24 hours.

Pineapple Salad: Substitute 1 can (13 1/4 ounces) pineapple chunks, drained for the mandarin oranges and snipped mint leaves for the parsley.

Birds Attacking Your Windows? Here's How to Stop It

(StatePoint) If you've ever noticed a bird attack your windows, you may wonder why this strange behavior is occurring. Beyond the potential disruption it might cause your family, repeated attacks can be harmful to birds. Understanding the problem however, can help you put a stop to it, and better protect the birds nesting on your property.

The Problem

Many birds will stake out a territory, perhaps by your home, and vigorously defend it. If a territorial bird discovers its reflection in your window, it may perceive this reflection to be another bird competing for its territory and mate, compelling the bird to attack. This attack of its own reflection can take the form of pecking or scratching at your window, as well as flying up and banging into your window. When repeated, these actions de-

plete a bird's energy and put its health and the health of its nesting young at risk. Though this can occur at any time of year, it happens most often in spring, with males.

A Solution

You can help stop this problem from occurring. One good solution designed to do so is Stop Bird Attack, a removable, white coating that may be sprayed on any window. It eliminates the bird's window reflection, calms the bird and stops the attack. Effective for Northern Cardinals, American Robins, California Towhees and other territorial birds, Stop Bird Attack is made by WindowAlert, a brand that also makes bird window decals and UV Liquid products that help prevent bird strikes (another common hazard to birds). Take it a Step Further

While you are at it, consider other dangers to birds that you can eliminate on your property. For example, by swapping out conventional pesticides with essential oils, you can ward off pests in your garden without putting birds at risk. You might also try keeping pet cats indoors or in an enclosure to prevent them from attacking birds.

"While your home's windows can be an unexpected hazard to birds, it's important to be aware of the easy solutions that can help keep them safe this spring nesting season and beyond," says Spencer Schock, founder of WindowAlert.


