



Holiday Shores Snow & Ice Procedures

Snow plowing and ice control begins when there is two inches of snow and more is expected or when ice begins to make the roads hazardous. Ice control material is applied to locations on an "as needed" basis. It takes 4-5 hours to plow the entire community with only two inches of snow. Salt will be used sparingly this year due to increased costs. Please be careful.

DO NOT CALL THE OFFICE TO SEE IF THE SNOW PLOWS ARE OUT OR TO REPORT SNOW. PLEASE BE PATIENT.

Heavy traffic hills and main roads are plowed first.

PRIORITY 1 ROADS

Cedar Lane, Shore Dr, Holiday Dr, Elm, Blvd De Cannes, Newport Bay, Holiday Point Pkwy, Carribean, Biscay, Waikiki, Castle, High Point, Su Twan, Fountainbleu, Treasure, Tamarach, Overlook and Birch.

What cautions should I be aware of?

Do not park on the road during the snow removal process. Do not push snow onto the roadway! This creates a very hazardous condition.

What about driveways?

Maintenance personnel are not authorized to plow driveways and plows will not be lifted at the entrance to each individual driveway. Clearance of driveway entrances is the responsibility of the resident. Plows may make several passes in order to widen the roads.

What about mailboxes?

The truck will get as close to the mailboxes as possible. It is the homeowner's responsibility to keep the area in front of the mailbox cleared. Keep mailboxes closed at all times.

What about trashcans on pick up days?

Trashcans and recycle containers must be 4' off the road. The snowplow drivers will not get out to move your containers and will not be responsible for damage.

USE CAUTION!

When maintenance is out on the roads, stay a safe distance behind the trucks. If you cannot see the mirrors on the trucks, they will not be able to see you.

Manager's Report by Rob Clarkson


Winter is here, and the Lake has yet to freeze over. When it does, we do not recommend you going out on the ice at any time. If you do use caution and never go alone. For any Ice related emergencies your first reaction should be to dial 911. The Fire Dept. is trained to conduct these types of rescues and this ensures you will not be a second victim. Stay on the phone till help arrives and forward as much information as possible to the emergency dispatcher.

The Boat show season is just about upon us. Check our Rules prior to purchasing your new boat or PWC to ensure it complies and avoid any problems when obtaining your 2020 Boat Stickers. Hulled crafts have a 22' and Pontoons have a 28' maximum length. Check the IDNR or Holiday Shores websites to understand how this measurement is taken. For your reference, in our Boating Rules, a diagram is located on page 4. If you do not have access to the internet come by the office and we will gladly provide you with the most current set of Rules.

Dues and Assessments are due. Members who may have difficulty staying current with this requirement should contact the office and communicate with us any special needs. Failure to do so will leave us no choice, except to proceed with collection efforts which adds costs to all involved. Communication with the Office is a key factor and could save us all added expenses and frustration.

Keep the forecast in mind when parking on the roads. If there is a snow event, the maintenance dept. will be working diligently to clear our roads, and vehicles parked alongside the roads makes their task that much more difficult.

2020 is a draw down year. Plan to repair docks and sea walls. The Lake Committee will be looking at the current conditions of sea walls and docks. You may receive a correspondence if your property is identified as needing to be repaired. Permits may be required so be sure to communicate with the Office prior to any work starting.







Profit & Loss

Tony Harris – We had a Finance Committee meeting this past Monday to review the numbers of where we are at. After the last check signing in December, it looks like we will have a balance of \$312,000 left. The reason we have so much left is because we carried over the ditching that hasn't been finished, that is \$139,000 plus the estimate for us doing the concrete and seeding work that is \$3,000. We also included in the budget this year that is a carry over from last year, \$35,000 for any potentially

needed repairs with getting a restauranteur into the restaurant. Those are some large amounts that haven't been spent. After those, it brings it down to \$135,000. The majority of that, the Finance Committee recommends that we carry it over to the roads and we have a couple wish list items for the maintenance building for around \$8,000 and that brings us down to about \$24,000. That is the status of where we are for spending for the year compared to our budget.

Old Business

Golf Carts/Slow Moving Vehicles

Dave Decker – We had a revision that we discussed at the last meeting and it looks like it was published on the sixth of this month. This rule is following very closely to the rule the state of Illinois has in place. Does anyone have any questions or comments at this point?

Monica O'Brien – Only that we do not have a fines structure to go with it.

Dave Decker – Does anyone have any thoughts on those? Is there a current structure that we would utilize or recommend utilization? **Monica O'Brien** – No. We just need to get together.

Bob Brakhane, 537 – When I read my Holiday Times, I noticed a lot of statements regarding golf carts from Board members and it was astonishing. One had stated that golf carts verses ATVs, that is flat out wrong. A golf cart is a slow-moving vehicle and an ATV is an off-road vehicle that can tear up your property. The vehicles that are tearing up property are ATVs, four wheelers and side-by-sides. There is no way that golf carts and those vehicles need to be considered the same. A golf cart is a slow-moving vehicle because they cannot go fast while those off-road vehicles can. How do you think these farmers get from property to property? They put up an orange slow moving vehicle triangle on the back of their vehicle.

Dave Decker – The discussion that was held was in regard to roads, it has nothing to do with driving the vehicles off of the roads.

Bob Brakhane, 537 – The ATVs should not be on the road at all because it is not a slow-moving vehicle unless it is licensed.

Dave Decker – You discussed the farmers and their vehicles.

Bob Brakhane, 537 – That is a slow-moving vehicle.

Dave Decker – No, most of them are ATVs with a slow-moving vehicle triangle sign on the back of it.

Bob Brakhane, 537 – I've had a couple medical issues and cannot drive just yet, so my golf cart is how I get around out here. When I am on the golf cart and there is a car behind me, I pull over. I just know some of these kids out here are driving them around and destroying property.

Dave Decker – That is why we brought this up to put guidelines in place on what is being done.

Bob Brakhane, 537 – To combine golf carts and all terrain vehicles just does not make any sense.

Anthony Harrell – A lot of the four wheelers are going to not fall under this because you have to have rear view mirrors and things like that, which lot of them don't. A lot of side-by-sides do have all of those things. Hopefully the drivers are obeying the speed limits.

Matt Ressler – I would like to see a fines structure once we get that. I think that will deter a lot of this damage on the north property and on the dam. My recommendation would be to have this fines structure the same as the boating structure we have in place.

Monica O'Brien – You mean by keeping the fraction levels the same? Matt Ressler – That is correct. Monica O'Brien - It's just a matter of placing the language in the rules. If anyone is willing to be on a committee with me to look at those things, I would be happy too. I don't want to do it by myself.

Anthony Harrell – I will help you with that.

Matt Ressler – Just so everyone knows, and it gets published in the Holiday Times, the \$15 fee for these decals will be put towards our roads. I have been asked several times.

Tony Harris – We should probably incorporate that into the language of this rule for future reference.

Madison County Sheriff Patrols

Matt Ressler – I do not have anything in front of me.

Dave Decker – Do we have anything scheduled for December?

Matt Ressler – They are working on it right now and I am still waiting for an update. The way the public requests are set up right now, they are very busy.

2019 Ditching Project

Dave Decker – I read this write up from you Rob, with the bid from the contractors for roughly \$41,000 to do the driveways and seeding. The line below says our material costs would be \$770 for concrete?

Rob Clarkson – Yes, for seven yards of concrete and three feet wide.

Dave Decker – That is per driveway?

Rob Clarkson – No, that is the total cost. I went out and measured it.

Monica O'Brien - In other words, this is a really high bid.

Rob Clarkson – Yes. There is only one driveway that has a picture frame in it. The rest are basic driveways. I believe they are bidding it this way, so

we do not have to saw cut it or rip the entire apron out.

Monica O'Brien - Did they just not want to do that work?

Steve Yates – I think it would be along the lines of being reliable after a period of time.

Dave Decker – I think we were holding on that decision before doing anything as far when we start doing the work. How is our timeline going to work with their timeline in regard to doing the work, ditching and driveway work?

Rob Clarkson – They will rock the driveway all the way to the top and will remove the rock before they pour the concrete.

Dave Decker – Will they do the cuts on the driveway?

Rob Clarkson – They will do the cuts because they have to remove the pipe and set it to elevation. They will rock it all back in like it is called out in the plan.

Dave Decker – Is there anything holding us from turning this thing loose other than the weather?

Rob Clarkson – The bid was a little higher than what we anticipated. This bid was \$138,000.

Tony Harris – I believe there is \$135,000 left in the budget when we had or Finance Meeting on Monday. Part of the overage we have in the total budget will cover the \$4,000 of the bid difference and the extra \$3,000 for concrete, seed and straw.

Rob Clarkson – We definitely have time to think about this one. **Dave Decker** – For the next meeting in January, put together all the costs associated with this, who is going to do what and what we had budgeted for.

By Lot Assessment

Matt Ressler – I have started putting together a committee. So far, I have recruited Kay Slayden and Jane Unsell.



Medic Minute - Winter Safety Tips. While we are in the middle of winter, here are some helpful hints to stay prepared and keep safe.

Equip for Emergencies at Home and When Traveling - Be prepared for weather-related emergencies, including power outages: stock water, and stock food that needs no cooking or refrigeration; keep your cell phone fully charged with portable charger and extra batteries; keep fully stocked emergency kit including battery operated devices such as a flashlight, weather radio and lamps along with extra batteries; first aid kit and extra medicine; and baby items. Do the same when you are traveling, and also: be aware of forecasted weather conditions; and inform someone of your proposed route and expected time of arrival. If you become stranded in your car: make your car visible to rescuers – tie a brightly colored cloth to the antenna, raise the hood of the car if it's not snowing, and turn on the inside overhead lights when your engine is running; move anything you need from the trunk into the passenger area and stay with your car unless safety is no more than 100 yards away; keep your body warm by wrapping your entire body including your head, in extra clothawake and keep moving – you will be less vulnerable to cold-related sled could break through the ice.

Firefighter Footnote - The final count health problems; if you are sitting, keep moving your arms and legs to improve circulation and stay warmer; run the motor (and heater) for partment ran 217 calls in 2019, breaking about 10 minutes per hour, opening one window slightly to let air in, and make sure that snow is not blocking the exhaust pipe to reduce the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning. Make sure to check on family and friends who are especially at risk from cold weather hazards. two lift assists, and one building fire. Each If you have pets, bring them inside; if you can't do that then provide adequate warm shelter and unfrozen water to drink.

> Winterize Your Car - Test your battery and tire pressure since battery power and tire pressure drops as the temperature goes down; make sure the cooling system is in good working order; place winter tires on your car with a deeper, more flexible tread, if using all-season tires then replace them if the tread is less than 1/16 of an inch (you should not be able to see above the top of Lincoln's head on a penny); check your wiper blades; add wiper fluid rated for -30 degrees Fahrenheit; keep your gas tank at least half full to avoid gas line freeze; and remember to keep your car's emergency preparedness kit fully stocked. Your kit should include: cell phone with portable charger and extra batteries; blankets; food and water; booster cables, flares, tire pump, and a bag of sand or kitty litter for traction; compass and maps; flashlight, battery-powered radio and extra batteries; first aid kit; and toilet paper and plastic bags. Before traveling - clean your car's external camera lenses and mirrors; remove dirt, ice and snow from all sensors to allow assistive-driving features (like automatic braking) to work; warm up your car if possible but never leave a vehicle running in your garage to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning; and always share your travel plans and routes with someone before you leave. To avoid a crash - avoid using cruise control in wintry conditions; steer in the direction of a skid; accelerate and decelerate slowly; increase following distance to 8-10 seconds; and if possible don't stop going uphill.

Sledding Safety - More than 20,000 children younger than 19 are treated for sledding injuries on average each year. Injuries can often occur when the sled hits a stationary object or the child falls off, so you may want to purchase sleds that can be controlled with a steering mechanism and brakes, and insist that they wear a helmet since they could get a head injury (which often includes skull fractures). If you take them to the local hill, make sure you stay with them. Don't sled ing, blankets or newspapers, and huddle with others if you can; stay on or around frozen lakes, streams or ponds as there is a chance the

Skiing & Snowboarding – Between 1996 and 2010 there were almost 80,000 snow sports-related head injuries among children and adolescents treated in Emergency Departments, and 77% were TBIs (traumatic brain injuries) – so always wear a helmet. Never snowboard or ski alone, no matter how experienced you are; you should not ski off designated trails, on closed runs or out of boundaries since these areas are not monitored – a rogue skier could even cause an avalanche; take lessons not just to learn how to ski and snowboard, but to learn how to fall and get back up; make sure you know the weather conditions before heading to the slopes; give skiers in front of you the right-of-way; if you have to stop, do so on the side of a run, not in the middle; look in all directions before crossing a trail, merging or starting down a hill; use skis with brakes or a snowboard with a leash to prevent runaway equipment; and make sure your gear fits properly and is functional in outdoor winter weather.

Snow Shoveling – Nationwide, snow shoveling is responsible for thousands of injuries and as many as 100 deaths each year. Sudden exertion, like moving hundreds of pounds of snow after being sedentary for several months, can put a big strain on your heart. Tips for shoveling snow: don't shovel after eating or while smoking; take it slow and stretch out before you begin; shovel only fresh, powdery snow – it's lighter; push the snow rather than lifting it but if you do lift then use a small shovel or only partially fill it; lift with your legs not your back; don't work to the point of exhaustion; if you show signs of a heart attack, stop immediately and call 911. Pushing a heavy

snow blower can also cause injury. Tips for snow blowing: if the blower jams then turn it off; keeps your hands away from moving parts; don't run it in an enclosed space due to possible carbon monoxide poisoning; add fuel outdoors before starting and never add any when it is running; and never leave a running snow blower unattended.

Flu Vaccinations - Once again, make sure you get your flu vaccine every winter. Those over age 65 and younger than five are at greater risk for flu-related illness and death. About 5-20% of people in the U.S. get the flu each year, depending on the severity of the outbreak; and flu-related deaths range from about 12,000 to 56,000 per year. The CDC (Center for Disease Control) recommends everyone older than six months get an annual flu vaccine – if you don't like needles you can ask your doctor if a nasal spray is available. The flu spreads through droplets when someone sneezes or coughs on surfaces and then others touch those areas. You are contagious one day before symptoms appear and up to a week after. If possible, avoid going to work or school if you don't feel well, and don't return until your fever is gone for at least 24 hours; avoid being around someone sick; wash your hands frequently or use hand sanitizer; cover your mouth when coughing or sneezing; avoid touching your face; and disinfect surfaces that may be contaminated. Usually Influenza A is the predominant strain, but this year Influenza B is more prevalent. Also, the flu season is hitting earlier and harder than usual this year, so make sure you get your flu vaccine - it's not too late!
